# Mapping Surgical Services in Rural British Columbia: An Environmental Scan

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## Introduction

- Quality surgical care is essential to a wellfunctioning health system
- There has been significant attrition of small-volume surgical sites in Canada, notably in rural regions of British Columbia (BC).<sup>1</sup>
- Family practice surgical providers Enhanced Surgical Skills (ESS) and
   Obstetrical Skills (OSS) are key providers
   of surgical care in rural contexts. <sup>7</sup>
- Despite this recognition, little is known about ESS/OSS volumes and distribution across rural BC.<sup>2,3,4,5,7</sup>

# Purpose

- To conduct an environmental scan of surgical care in rural BC, including practice locations and procedures performed by ESS/OSS.
- To support maintenance and improvement of rural surgical care by proposing a collaboration with our Rural Surgery Working Group to identify Continuing Professional Development (CPD) priorities for ESS/OSS physicians in rural BC.

# Methods

Rural BC communities with functioning hospitals and populations ranging 1,000 - 25,000 were included.<sup>8</sup> Data was collected between Jan 1 – Nov 30 2022, including:

- Hospital locations
- Practice locations of ESS, OSS, family practice anesthesia (FPA), anesthesiologists, general surgeons, and OBGYN
- Procedures billed by family physicians (FP), general surgeons, and obstetrician-gynaecologists (OBGYN) in rural BC communities

### Results

### **Mapping of Surgical Sites and Personnel**

- 45 rural BC communities
  - 17 with local specialty surgeons
  - 5 with ESS/OSS as only local surgical providers
  - 23 with no local surgical personnel
- 48 general surgeons
- 34 OBGYN
- 27 anesthesiologists
- 76 FPA
- 11 ESS/18 OSS practicing in 15 (33.3%) communities
- ESS/OSS were the sole local surgical providers in five communities: Creston, Fernie, Revelstoke, Smithers, and Vanderhoof.

## **Procedures Performed by FPs**

- High number of obstetric procedures including C-sections, sterilizations, and surgical abortions.
- Various general surgical procedures: colonoscopies, hernia repairs, and open and laparoscopic appendectomies.
- Select procedures from other surgical domains (Table 1, Table 2).

### Conclusion

Despite a provincial and national movement to improve access to and quality of surgical care in remote and rural communities, surgical care in remote and rural BC remains limited. Family physicians provide core surgical services in rural BC, sometimes as the sole local surgical providers. Supporting these providers is integral to the wellbeing of rural patients and the healthcare systems they access. These physicians require further support in post-graduate CPD to maintain their competencies, volumes, and confidence. We call on surgical care providers in BC to join a Rural Surgery Working Group and collaborate to identify CPD priorities for ESS/OSS physicians in rural BC.

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
